This theory highlights the importance of intrinsic motivation, an inherent drive to seek challenges, learn, and explore without external rewards, and how this natural inclination contributes to lifelong enjoyment and vitality (Deci & Ryan, 2008). Most actions, especially in adulthood, are not strictly driven by intrinsic motivation due to social pressures and responsibilities. Deci and Ryan emphasize that motivation from within, driven by interests, curiosity, and values, plays a significant role in personal development and well-being. This creative work applies SDT to illustrate the challenges faced by the main character, Maya, who navigates social pressures and personal determination to overcome her quarter-life crisis. The research involved browsing articles, reading relevant literature, and understanding genre conventions to create a screenplay that effectively conveys the chosen topic.

The methodology involved secondary research, including internet browsing for articles and journals related to the influence of the environment on behavior and overcoming past challenges. The creative process involved selecting a general topic, focusing on detailed discussion points, and choosing a suitable genre to convey the message effectively. The screenplay development included creating character details, plot, roles, problems, background information, loglines, step outlines, pitches, and synopses.
